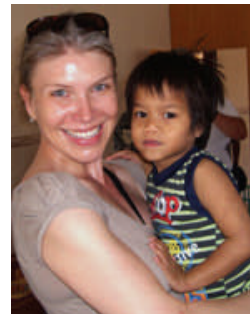

"Many would argue that altruism has been supported by evolution because it helps the group survive. But some people sacrificially give of themselves to those who are outside their group and with whom they have absolutely nothing in common. That is the nobility of humankind in its purist form."

I just happened to be reading *National Geographic* in my hotel room in Saigon when I read the statement above from Francis Collins, leader of the Human Genome Project and one of the world's most important scientists.

The statement he made really resonated with me. The efforts and amazing gestures made by the indi-

viduals that I had the privilege of traveling with have made a huge impact on my life.

Pre-conceived Notions

Before embarking on the trip, I had several pre-conceived notions. One was that I would experience culture shock shortly after arriving in Vietnam. This was not the case. Yes, I was overwhelmed by the frenetic pace in the streets of Hanoi, but I thought, "This is no different from Manhattan in terms of the intensity and sheer determination on the part of the city dwellers to get to their destination and get there fast!"

At one point, I watched a little girl show Pat Keegan her personal belongings placed neatly on a small section of a shelf. Moments later, Pat and I talked about how important it is for children to have something to call their own, as it helps them form their identity and develop a sense of self. At first I felt sad that she didn't have anything more than what was on that shelf to call her own, but then I thought, "Does it really matter?"

The following day at Vinh Son 2, I bonded with a little girl named Lui. We played ball and laughed. While we were sitting together, she took off a decorative hair band that she had around her wrist and put it around mine. As we were about to leave, I handed it back to her and she gestured that she wanted me to keep it. I was amazed....a girl who seemingly has

Positive Changes

After witnessing all of the wonderful improvements and changes that have taken place due to the generosity of the supporters of Vinh Son, and knowing that conditions would only get better, I did not feel sorry for the children, as I thought I would. I felt that they were blessed.

After my experiences in Vietnam, I have a renewed sense of purpose. I plan on going back to Vietnam soon to visit the children and I encourage anyone reading this to also consider visiting. It was a life-changing experience for me, as I believe it will be for anyone who decides to make the journey.

I'm also considering joining the Peace Corp or going back to school and studying Early Childhood Education...or both!

I want to thank my fellow travelers and Tano for making the trip that much more memorable. It's amazing what you learn when you open yourself up to new experiences and give without any expectation of getting anything back.
