Three years ago was my first trip to Viet Nam and the chance to visit the orphanages with Dave Chaix (FVSO ex-President) leading the way. I have returned twice since then, and each time I go back to the FVSO orphanages, I become more committed to the children and the need to help in any way that I can. Next January will be my fourth trip to Viet Nam with Dave, and I plan on more visits in the future.

On my first visit, my wife Susan (now deceased), and I met a wonderful teenage girl at VS-6 named Y Uen. She spoke to us in broken English, explained that she wanted to be a teacher, and from watching her with the other children, we immediately knew that she was going to be a leader and a great example for the kids. We decided to help her with her college education and she has become a wonderful young lady. She keeps us informed about her life in school, her grades, friends and her continuing personal assistance and support at VS-6. Y Uen is a great example of how "pay it forward" can work. She receives our assistance, and eventually passes that dedication down to her work with the Sisters and children at VS-6.

I am passionate about helping the children and wish I could do more. This last February I met a young lady at VS-5, Y Lay. In talking to her through Tano, I found out that she also wants to help the children at the orphanages in the future and possibly become a Sister. When ready, she will also receive help with the cost of her higher education.

Y Uen was an orphan at VS6 and is now getting ready to graduate from college. She is very active in supporting Vinh Son, especially the remote location we call VS-6. She has filled a critical leadership role to help Sr Laboure manage VS-6. Y Uen not only excels in her classes but she also has long list of duties she has assumed. She is responsible for caretaking of the little ones, supporting her fellow students in extracurricular programs, running errands, and maintaining an internship to prepare her for a career in teaching. Y Uen is a wonderful example of the job the Sisters are doing to prepare the kids for their future. Through Gene's marvelous support, the entire VSO community will benefit.

Return to Minh Quy Montagnard Hospital John Browne

In April of this year, my son, Ryan, and I traveled to Vietnam with Clyde Lewandowski and Nga Wynne (Board members of FVSO) and a small group of vets and family. I wanted to experience the changes that had taken place in Vietnam and to see what remained of the country I knew almost 50 years ago.



Amid a booming economy and deforestation, however, little of that earlier time remains. But diligent efforts by our guide, Tano, revealed clues and locations of old SF border camps, relay outposts and airstrips. A few sites, however, like the Old Wooden Church and other shrines in KonTum, were little changed from the pictures I took in the early 70's.

One site in particular that I wanted to find was the old Minh Quy Montagnard hospital in KonTum, founded by Dr. Pat Smith in the late 1950's. Dr. Smith and her staff of Montagnard and western medical providers and nurses were a beacon of light and hope for the Montagnard people during that bleak and dark time. My first visit to Minh Quy was as a patient (briefly) in early 1971, followed by regular trips over the next year delivering supplies and medicines.

Tano located the old hospital, now in total disrepair and occupied by a group of squatters. Sadness at seeing the old buildings in ruins was offset, however, by meeting Sister Gabriel and Sister Francois, two remarkable Montagnard nuns who had served at Minh Quy until War's end. Although we never formally met during the War, we most certainly crossed paths in that busy hospital. Sharing that connection with them was the high point of my recent visit. Hearing their stories, especially of the final year of the War, and their ordeals afterward, filled me with sorrow, but also a profound respect for their perseverance and unwavering faith. Each Sister now supervises a Vinh Son orphanage complex, having dedicated their lives to the Montagnard people and their children.

To paraphrase a former worker: "Although Minh Quy hospital as such no longer exists, the spirit of Minh Quy lives on in the lives of these two Sisters and their staffs at Vinh Son."


