First of all, I would like to take this opportunity to thank you, the FVSO leaders, for giving me the opportunity to share my story with people around the world through the FVSO Newsletter.

About 21 years ago, a baby girl whose name is Y RIM, was born and my parents were so happy to welcome the new member into our family. We were a lovely family of ten people, who enjoyed a very happy life.

However, the loss of my mother brought a lot of sadness, since eight of us were still very young. On top of that, being a single dad was a big challenge for my father who now was responsible for doing the duties of a mother and a father. As you can imagine, this was not an easy life at all. All my brothers and sisters did not go to school because they had to help my father work in the fields. Me and my two younger brothers, who were only four and two years old, did not work the fields.

Unfortunately, this part of my life didn't last long. Just a few months after my mother died, my father was also taken to Heaven. We were orphaned children from that time on, so you can see how difficult our lives were.

I used to think that my life would be like my other brothers and sisters, never going to school and living a life working for people to buy food for us. However, it was destiny the day I was sent to Vinh Son 2, because it totally changed my life. When I was five, my sister took me to see Sr. Magdalena, the superior of Vinh Son 2, to ask her permission for me to stay at the Vinh Son 2 orphanage. After hearing my story, Sr. Magdalena was very happy to welcome me as a new member of Vinh Son 2.

I easily made friends with other kids, and I felt so much at home there. For me, living in Vinh Son 2 was so amazing because even though all the children were from different villages and spoke different languages, we all lived as brothers and sisters of one family. Indeed, every one of us was able to go to school, which was my biggest dream.

Thinking back, I am so grateful for the help of the Immaculate Miraculous Medal (IMM) Sisters who dedicate their life to serving the poor, the sick, and especially taking care of orphaned children like me. They are just like mothers, sisters and dear friends to me. They not only care for us with food and clothing, but our spiritual life also. Besides teaching us about knowledge, the sisters also teach us to be better people.

In addition to the sisters' help, thanks to FVSO and other benefactors, every Vinh Son child is now having a better life. As you know, without your support, it would be difficult for the IMM Sisters to run all six orphanages. Now all of us are able to go to school and college, and help make our dreams come true.

Words are never enough to express gratitude to you for what you have done for me and countless others. As my dream of becoming a nurse is coming true, I will try my best to do good both in school and at home, so I can graduate and have a job at Vinh Son 2. Now I am in the first year of college. Being a nurse and helping other orphaned children has always been the only dream I wanted to achieve. For this reason, I promise to study hard and be a good person. I am so busy at school, and I am free only on weekends, but I still spend all my free time teaching and taking care of the kids at Vinh Son 2, my second home.



Major Drought hits Vietnam

El Niño has been affecting parts of Southeast Asia countries since the last quarter of 2015, with conditions expected to improve in the second quarter of 2016. Viet Nam is one of the countries which is severely affected, mostly by higher temperatures and below-average precipitation during the rainy season. This combination of events has led to drought in the southern central, the central highlands, and the Mekong Delta of Viet Nam.

HCM CITY — Drought in the Tây Nguyên (Central Highlands) region has seriously affected farming and the lives of local residents in the region.

About 180,000ha of rice, crops and other trees in the provinces of Đắk Lắk, Đắk Nông, Kon Tum, Lâm Đồng and Gia Lai have faced a shortage of water since the middle of this month, according to the Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development (MARD).

Trần Trung Thành, deputy director of the Tây Nguyên Centre for Hydrometeorology Forecasting, said the ongoing El Nino phenomenon was the most extreme of the last 60 years and it would cause a record drought in the Highlands.

“The peak of the drought will occur in early April,” he said.

The region’s rainfall between December 2015 and February 2016 has fallen by 40 per cent against the same period last year, according to the Tây Nguyên Centre for Hydrometeorology Forecasting.

The water levels of most reservoirs in the region have fallen by 15-35 per cent compared to the average of many years. More than 35 rivers and springs and 40 per cent of small reservoirs have dried up.

The region has also faced a shortage of daily use water, with Đắk Lắk being the hardest-hit province as it has about 25,000 affected households. People in Đắk Lắk have drilled wells and built dams to take water

So far, the orphanages seem to be doing alright. There have been reports of water re-cycling used for garden irrigation. We will monitor this situation closely. Anecdotal reports from friends living in villages in the Pleiku area state there is water for personal use, but not for the crops.
