The Mid-Fall Moon Festival, September 24, 2018

Tet Trung Thu, as it is known in Vietnam, or the Mid-Fall Moon Festival as we refer to it in America, is a wonderful, ancient festival that revolves around children.

This Festival is one of the two most popular festivals in Vietnam, and has been important to families in Vietnam for many years.

Tet Trung Thu is very much like a combination of our Halloween and Thanksgiving. Children parade on the streets, while singing and carrying colorful lanterns of different sizes. Some of the popular shapes include fishes, stars, butterflies and a lantern that spins when a candle is inserted, representing the earth circling the sun. Dances are also traditional, and include the dragon dance and the flower dance.

It is customary to give boxes of moon cakes, which are traditionally very rich in taste. The cakes are filled with lotus seeds, ground beans and orange peels and have a bright yoke in the center to represent the moon.

Today, the Mid-Fall Moon Festival, as well as encouraging affection for children, promotes education, poetry, dance and arts and crafts. Showing our love for our children and teaching of Vietnam's love for their children is a wonderful reason to celebrate!

Letter from one of our newest scholarship recipients

Dear FVSO, my name is Y Luin. I am 18 years old, a freshman at K23 of Kon Tum Community College, and currently I am studying English Education and am living in Vinh Son-1. This year I was very lucky to have you and FVSO to help, I am very happy.

At the beginning, I would like to thank FVSO. In the past month, I have received the full amount of money sent by FVSO is \$175; That money I bought a phone and a school bag, the sum of which is 3,769,000 VND. I saved the remaining money to use for other things at school such as class funds, photocopying materials. Up to now, I have been in school for over a month already. On the first day when I first set foot in the new school, I was very nervous, anxious, but also happy because I was introduced to many new teachers. In the subclass there are 20 students, mostly ethnic minority children; I was appointed to be the second leader in class, so I had to take more responsibilities than my classmates. I was very nervous, but then I tried to overcome and learned a lot from that.

This September, in Vietnam, I celebrated many holidays, especially the Mid-Autumn Festival. It was a children's festival in Asia and the celebration of our Saints of Vinh Son. On that day, the Sisters organized for us to play. I will send the pictures that were taken that day for you and our benefactors to see. I was with other friends at Vinh Son-1, and participated in some acts/plays for the Sisters to see. They were very happy.

At the end of the letter, I wish you and FVSO and the benefactors with good health a great abundance of God's grace. May the Lord and Mary always support and accompany you so that you are able to continue to help us. I will try to study well so that I can find a stable job and be able to help others who have a more difficult life.




Enlisting new benefactors

- Tell your personal story. Why are you a member of this team? What would you tell a potential supporter about FVSO? Your history might prompt others to reach out to the children of FVSO.




Legacy Fund Update
