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## Memories made, friendships forged





#### Dave's summary report of his 2013 visit

Every other year, Dave gathers a group of folks who are interested in touring Southeast Asia generally, and Vietnam in particular. He also invites those who have been continuing supporters of FVSO, who would like to see, first hand, their donations at work. This year, 13 were first-time visitors to the orphanages. Each paid their own way.

We arrived in Pleiku Airport and bussed to Kontum Thursday January 30, 2013, checking in at the Thinh Vuong Hotel, a small family hotel on Nguyen Trai Street in Kontum. Everyone needed a good night's sleep before our big day at Vinh Son.

The next day, we started at Vinh Son 1 behind the Wooden Church. We usually visit the Wooden Church first, but services were being held, so off to VS 1. We were graciously greeted by Sister Imelda and Sister Marie Kham in the reception room, which is badly in need of repair from termite damage. We were given refreshments of tea and bananas and had a very nice visit.

Being a Thursday, most of the children were attending government schools, so we toured the orphanage and as usual were impressed by the cleanliness. VS 1 is one of the largest facilities and we've supported it since 2001. It is very gratifying to see the improvements over the years and the many projects completed by us and other charitable groups from around the world.

After lunch we visited the other large orphanage, Vinh Son 2, which is also located in the city of Kontum. Back in 2002, Vinh Son 2 became the second orphanage to receive care from FVSO. We were met by Sister Jeanne and the children singing in English, French & Vietnamese. What a treat!!!

We toured the facilities and, again, were quite impressed with the organization at VS 2. Sister Jeanne, the other Sisters and caregivers do such a wonderful job there. A couple hundred children can be a challenge, but from what we observed, Sister Jeanne and company have it under control.

We had the opportunity to observe the children while they had their lunch. Quite a change from years before, when there were no vegetables, meat or fish in their rice bowls. Another great visit with these wonderful children.

Our Treasurer, Colleen Sands, and I spent some time at the Convent, visiting with Sister Michel, the Mother Superior, a wonderful person. We discussed what is working well and what we might need to improve upon. A very productive meeting but we came away realizing there is always more to do.

As arranged, we returned to Vinh Son 1 at 7PM for the performance put on by the children and narrated by our great guide, Tano. The children did a magnificent job entertaining us. Before we knew it, all of us travelers ended up on the dance floor with the children. A good time was definitely had by all.

Friday January 31 we split into 2 groups with Colleen taking one group to VS 5 and a visit to the Novices field location. I took the other group to visit VS 3, 4 & 6, only in reverse order.

#### Dave's report continued...

We visited Vinh Son 6 first, the furthest out of the orphanages, on a rutted dirt road off Highway 24, north of Kontum. We have been working at VS 6 since 2010. The children were ready and singing when we arrived, always wonderful. We were able to see the kitchen (being) built with funds from Derek Smith's group in Australia, Diny Jansen-van der Linden from the Netherlands and FVSO. It's an example of a successful joint project, with the added plus of water filtration provided by VietDreams, Milpitas, CA and FVSO. We really have great partners!!! Currently under construction is a new dormitory being funded by Richard Grame and Associates, Walnut Creek, CA.

As we worked our way back toward Kontum, our next stop was at Vinh Son 4 and a visit with Sister Lien and the children – this was the orphanage we visited in August and were so impressed with all Sister Lien had accomplished on her own, like the new fish pond that raises fish for use at the orphanage as well as for sale. There have been many improvements since we began working here in 2007, with our good partners mentioned above, along with another partner, Colour4Kids from the Netherlands, who have worked with us at most of the orphanages.

Our last stop of the day was Vinh Son 3 and Sister Gabriel – what a wonderful person. VS 3 is one of the smaller orphanages, very well run, which we also started supporting in 2007. We have another joint project (new kitchen) at VS 3 with our good partners Derek Smith's Group from Australia and Diny Jansen-van der Linden from the Netherlands. We have also worked here with Dorinda Cavanaugh's Group from Canada and the 189<sup>th</sup> Attack Helicopter Association.

This completed our visits up Highway 24 and we returned to the Convent for a wonderful lunch with the Mother Superior and some of the Sisters. After lunch, we traveled to Pleiku, visited the central market and checked into the Hoang Anh Pleiku Hotel for the night.

Saturday morning, February 2<sup>nd</sup> we started the day with a visit to the Sao Mai Orphanage, which FVSO has supported since 2011. This orphanage was known as Tu Tam Orphanage in the 1960's and many of our supporters and some Board Members worked there during their tour of duty. We were greeted by Sister Khiet, who will be retiring in August at the age of 82. (the children were present to welcome us since there is no school on the weekend) We were entertained by them and very much enjoyed our visit. Along with FVSO, Sao Mai also receives much support from the 189<sup>th</sup> Assault Helicopter Association.

I should mention here that all 7 orphanages have filtered water provided by systems funded by VietDreams, Milpitas, CA and FVSO, Auburn, CA. The installation and maintenance is done by MK Company, Da Nang, VN.

## Chance meeting leads to a local on-line news article

(partial transcript below)

Late this afternoon, we accidentally met a group of foreigners who are here for a long tour and shopping in Pleiku. At first glance, they appeared to be just visitors who were older and taller, but when we approached and talked to them, we felt the closeness and warmth from them, who choose to travel to our country this spring to understand our people and culture.



For nearly 10 years, members of this group of FVSO supporters have been helping the children at the Vinh Son orphanages in Kon Tum and for the past 2 years have been helping orphans at Sao Mai here in Pleiku. Each year some of the FVSO members visit Vietnam, to help the orphans with medical and dental care, food, shelter and education.

### The good Sisters at VS-1 had much to smile about



VS-1 was in bad need of a walkway (pictured new above) that connected the upper and lower levels, where two dorms located. For some time, this unpaved path has been noticeably eroding, causing mud and sand to be tracked into the buildings. Footing has been dangerous as well. In January, 2013, FVSO committed funds to make the needed repairs.





Above, steady progress can be seen on roadway repairs. At a cost of about \$2,500, this simple project will have a big impact on the inhabitants of Vinh Son.



I have often been asked how I became involved with the Vinh Son and Sao Mai Orphanages.

In 2001, Pat McKee, our Senior Vice President, and I went on a 4<sup>th</sup> & 25<sup>th</sup> ID tour of Vietnam organized by a company called MilSpec Tours, of Flourtown PA Owner, Butch Sincock, introduced us to Vinh Son 1 and the rest is history.
